We sadly bid goodbye to June Talbot who has for some years been a stalwart supporter of GROUP ANALYSIS in her capacity as Trust Administrator. She has left for fresh fields at the National Children's Fund. In her place we welcome Paul Dayton who has agreed to continue to help in the journal's production.

I must thank the members of the Editorial Board who helped to make my task as Editor extremely stimulating and pleasant. I think I am justified in remarking that GROUP ANALYSIS continues to flourish though I must apologise for the many errors of the last issue, the causes for which have been rectified.

Our circulation slowly increases and we are glad that despite inflation and an increase in the size of the journal, the price has remained the same over the last four years.

We value comments in the Correspondence section and wish to know whether people feel the material submitted is relevant to our subscribers' interests. This section on the whole is not as lively as we should like it to be. What is wanted are informal letters and replies in an on-going dialogue. Articles do not have to be formal either - we look for fresh rather than highly "scientific" contributions, spontaneous, short rather than long - and preferably not more than five pages.

We wish to express our thanks to Elizabeth Foulkes for the continued effort and care that goes into the annual indexing which is appearing in this issue for the 1978 volume.

This issue also contains the reports and papers of the Fourth European Symposium and Workshop held in Stockholm last August, which it is our privilege to be presenting here. Thank you, Göran Ahlin!
